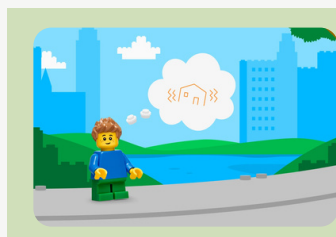


LEGO Brings Learning to Life

Drowning Prevention LEGO

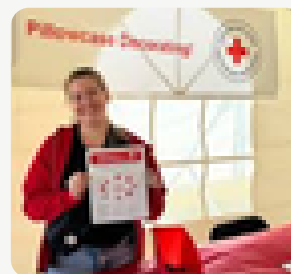

The Red Cross has an evidence-based, successful emergency school-based program adapted for Canada and Canadian Indigenous Communities and piloted in 2024: The Pillowcase Project. This engaging school-based project encourages children to talk to their parents about emergency risks such as flooding, fire risks, and safe evacuation procedures and preparation. Families and communities become more resilient from the youngest to the eldest as a result of conversations and school-based activities like the Pillowcase Project.
